#### CHAIRMAN'S UPDATE—DECEMBER 2014



Greetings from LOCA and our best wishes to all for a great Christmas and New Year. 2014 has been a positive year for Okareka in a number of areas and these include:

Property revaluations: as expected we now have more realistic valuations of many of the properties at Tarawera and Okareka although this is unlikely to result in lower rates in the catchment as a result of the

Council's serious financial situation at the present time. District Council changes: A new Mayor and a major restructure of staff together with policy changes this year, have been positive for Lakes residents and resulted in new opportunities for us.

Council's recent name change to The Rotorua Lakes Council has recognised the Lakes as an integral part of the district for tourism and future growth.

Council has also recognised the benefits to Okareka by giving us the opportunity to manage the Boyes Beach camping facility with all revenue to be used for community projects. Already some of this income has been used to upgrade the parking areas at the jetty boat launch area, the Boyes Beach parking area and in particular to extend and upgrade the parking at the Community Hall. We have arranged this work ourselves with great cooperation from Guy Gaddum Contracting.

This funding is in addition to the revenue we receive from DOC as a result of managing The DOC campground on Millar Road. This revenue is earmarked in the first instance to assist with funding the walking track from Boyes Beach to the DOC camp. It will also be available for other worthwhile environmental enhancement in the catchment.

Good progress is being made with the walking track between the two campgrounds and we are looking forward to its completion in the New Year. This is a major project for Landcare Okareka and LOCA partnership with costs of around \$100,000 and many, many hours of volunteer labour.

The improvements to the Tarawera Transfer Station have been completed and is now the Tarawera Recycling Facility open 7 days a week for recycling suitable rubbish and disposing of Council Rubbish bags at no charge. It has been a joint project between Tarawera, Okareka and the Lakes Community Board with proactive support from both the District and Regional Councils. Removal of gorse in the area and landscaping are scheduled for the New Year.

Council now has money available for community projects through their Matching Fund. The community contribution can be in providing money, labour, timber, plants etc and Council will match it with money. Tarawera already have a community vegetable garden under this scheme and Landcare Okareka will be meeting with Council shortly to discuss our involvement.

The upgrade of the Lake Outlet through to Tarawera is now scheduled for Feb-

ruary/March next year and hopefully will go some way to ensure the lake level is better controlled than it has been in the past.

The lack of **Cell Phone** coverage in the area continues to be a major and frustrating problem that should have been rectified by now. There is a suitable site at the top of Millar Road for a cell phone tower and the cost will be covered by Central Government under their high speed broadband roll-out scheme. We have lobbied every man and his dog and whilst we are assured it will be approved shortly, in the meantime there will of course be serious accidents on roads, walking tracks and lakes etc where a prompt phone call would possibly save lives. Enough said.

The holiday season will once again put pressure on **Traffic Management** at the Lakes and in particular at the Blue Lake so please drive carefully as many of the visitors and tourists will be here for the first time. You will note there is now a 50km speed limit from the DOC reserve on Tarawera Road to Loop Road at the Blue Lake.

Unfortunately Council continue to support events involving lake and road closures on Wellington and Auckland Anniversary weekends which will result in many visitors to Okareka. There will also be approximately 50 campervans leaving the area every morning at peak periods.

The **International Ultra Marathon** is scheduled for Waitangi weekend coming through Okareka the morning of 7 February and stopping at Boyes Beach for drinks/food. The organiser assures us it will be well managed and the supporters (1000 entries) will park at the Blue Lake and be bussed back and forth to Boyes Beach.

Included with this newsletter is the **Okareka 2015 Phone Book** which is going to all residents and ratepayers at no charge. Additional copies are available if required.

The Fire Force continues to be an important asset to Okareka and apart from the excellent training etc the volunteers receive, the recent sponsorship of the Guy Fawkes fireworks (many thanks Dennis) and the social for the locals were very much appreciated (thanks Phil and Blair).

Okareka is a special place to live and holiday and this is enhanced by all the **volunteers** who make contributions in so many ways either as individuals or team members or lobby on our behalf when required.

They all know who they are and I would like to acknowledge their contributions. Thank you.

Take care and look after one another.



#### FROM THE LAKES HARBOURMASTER AND MARITIME TEAM

#### Call for boats and jet skis to slow down on the lakes December 2014

A drowning on Lake Rotorua last week was a stark reminder about always wearing a lifejacket and keeping a close eye on lake conditions, the Lakes Harbour Master says. Bay of Plenty Regional Council Lakes Harbour Master, Pererika Makiha, says he's hoping boaties and jetskiers keep to the rules on the water this summer. "Lake conditions can change so quickly that people get caught out. Always wear a lifejacket, even if you don't think you need one."

Speeding is the most common reason for Bay of Plenty Regional Council Maritime officers and lake wardens to have to pull people up on the lakes. There are 32 active Lake Wardens spread around the seven main lakes who train twice a year. People failing to keep to the rules are putting themselves and other lake users at risk, Mr Makiha said.

The number of offenses during last summer was the same as the previous year, other than speeding on jetskis, which almost doubled. Fifteen jetskiers were warned and five fined for speeding, compared with eight warnings and three fines the previous year. Fewer warnings and infringement notices were issued for boats using the lakes, except for those not wearing lifejackets. The number of boaties fined dropped from 22 to 5 last summer, and the number warned for speeding dropped from 18 to 11. Four people in canoes were warned about not wearing lifejackets, but boaties were mostly wearing them, he said.

Most offenders came from Tauranga, almost double the number from the previous year, while offenders from Hamilton almost halved. The number of local offenders stayed the same, with 13 stopped, Mr Makiha said. Offences in Lakes Rotoma, Rotoiti and Tikitapu all rose, but offenses were halved on Lakes Tarawera and Okareka.

Mr Makiha said the number of accidents, incidents and near-misses had risen in line with an increase in the number of jetskis on the region's waterways, particularly on the lakes. Most incidents involved males aged 17 to 30. "We wonder how many unreported near-misses there have been between jetskiers and other lake users. People forget that they are as powerful and as fast as a car, and the law currently allows anyone 15 and over to be in charge of one. With so many people out on our waterways, one person behaving badly can put a lot of other people at risk," Mr Makiha said.

The Regional Council's Maritime team will have little tolerance this summer for vessel users not carrying lifejackets, not having an observer when waterskiing or towing any other water sport device and exceeding five knots near swimmers, divers and small boats.


All vessels, including jetskis, are required to carry enough properly fitting lifejackets for everyone on board, and people should wear them when the skipper requires it, such as crossing a bar, or in extreme weather. In the Waikato, council bylaws require everyone in a boat under six metres to wear a lifejacket while underway.

"We also recommend that kayakers, stand-up paddle boarders, waka ama paddlers and canoeists wear a lifejacket at all times," Mr Makiha said.

#### Jetski rules

- You must be 15 or older to drive a powered vessel capable of travelling faster than 10 knots.
- You must not go faster than 5 knots when within 50 metres of another vessel or person in the water and within 200 metres of the shore, a dive flag or any structure.
- Life jackets of the correct size and fit for each person on board a vessel (including jet skis), must be stowed on board if not being worn.
- The wake of your vessel must not cause danger or damage to other vessels or water users.
- When skiing/towing there must also be an observer aged over 10 years on board it takes three to ski.
- The person being towed must wear a life jacket.
- You can be fined \$200 for breaching any of these rules.

## The Lake Okareka Volunteer Rural Fire Force

Another festive season has rolled around and summer is almost upon us.

The usual November downpours will create an abundance of growth (called fine fuels) such as long grass and new foliage which are easily combustible as they dry out over the summer months. When we enter a prohibited fire period, which I'm sure we will come late January/February/March, this fuel loading will be at its optimum for burning hence I request that any smoke seen around the village and surrounding areas are reported via the 111 emergency system as soon as possible. Any delays in attending vegetation fires can be catastrophic given the volatility of these fine fuels.

Please also remember that we are now in a restricted fire season which means no open flame fires of any sort are allowed (rubbish fires, barbeques, braziers, etc.) without a fire permit. If you obtain a permit for a fire, please adhere to all conditions specified in the permit.

With the arrival of warm summer nights, there is an increased likelihood that fires on the foreshore of the lake may occur. Often people may not be aware of the current fire restrictions. However, we are aiming to use part of our Wednesday night training over summer to visit campsites and raise awareness.

We have had a fairly busy year this year and are currently sitting on 41 call-outs, several of which have been structure fires with fortunately no fatalities as most buildings had smoke detectors installed. This provides a timely reminder to ensure your smoke detectors are in good working order and to get your chimneys swept after winter.

As you may or may not be aware, the speed limit has been lowered from 100km to 50km starting at the DOC reserve at the Blue Lake to just inside Okareka Loop Road. Given the number of people using the Blue Lake frontage, it is not surprising that this has been implemented.

We had a hugely successful inaugural Guy Fawkes celebration at Boyes Beach on 5 November. It was a bit disappointing to observe a local resident with obvious intentions of stealing some of our firewood collected for the bonfire. It's a pity we didn't catch him red-handed as a guy for the bonfire would have come in useful! Given the inclement weather on the night, it was fantastic to see so many locals turn up and support the Fire Force with this event. A big thank you to Dennis Falconer who donated the fireworks and set-up the display which was nothing short of spectacular! Thanks also to Mike and Sandra Goodwin for donating their time to ensure the lake closure was adhered to.

Two weeks later, we were also fortunate to have the talents of Zane, Degge and Imogen available to put on a show of acrobatics and juggling at the fire station for the community. For those who don't know, Zane and Degge were semi-finalists in the New Zealand's Got Talent show. Together with Imogen they tour around the country during their holiday breaks from university and put on shows at schools. (Thanks to Chester Boyes for providing photos of the talent show and Guy Fawkes evenings.)

Early December a group of Lake Okareka firefighters will be putting on their own show by attempting the Goat run from the Whakapapa to Turoa ski fields. We have also got six members entered into the Firefighter Sky Tower Stair Challenge in May 2015 for Leukaemia and Blood Cancer New Zealand. Fundraising for this event is

now underway to assist with the research, education and support services that Leukaemia and Blood Cancer New Zealand carry out. 

#### Nativity play on Friday 5<sup>th</sup> December



#### TIKITAPU SCENIC RESERVE PEST CONTROL PROGRAMME

A big thank you to all those who have helped with the Tikitapu Pest Control Project this year. The project depends on your assistance. As well as the

main working bees, the roster for checking and maintaining the Mistletoe and Nature walks has continued. Parents and children from the Kiwi Conservation Club have once again looked after the monitoring on rat line 1. We appreciate having their involvement and the introduction of youngsters to this type of conservation work.

The pest control project for 2014 is now complete. The toxins of Pindone and Feratox® (cyanide) were used again this year, and the results have been satisfactory as shown on the chart below. The ? for the number of marsupials is because we awaiting an expert second opinion on one wax tag, as to whether the bite is a large rat or a small marsupial!

The number of kills found was 67 possums, 2 young possums, 6 wallaby and 1 rat. Prior to baiting a trapper also got 22 possums and 1 rat.

The caution period for the reserve will continue until the signs are taken down, approximately 4 months after the stations were cleared at the end of September.



This time is required for the complete decomposition of the carcasses and degredation of the

bait. Until the signs are removed please do not touch any carcasses and remember to keep dogs out of the reserve at all times.

The annual monitoring of bird activity in Tikitapu Reserve, to determine if bird abundance is increasing as a result of the pest management strategy that is carried out in the Reserve, has now been completed. Counts at each of the 26 established stations were undertaken during November and shared by twelve volunteers. With a minimum of three counts per station this entailed quite a number of early morning hours. This year the 20 stations within the Tikitapu Re-

serve were supplemented with a further six stations in a nearby area of bush where there has been no pest control for comparison. Although the data is still being collated we can see that there are lots of tui, bellbirds and grey warblers in the Reserve. Other birds commonly recorded include tomtits, whiteheads, both shining and long-tailed cuckoos, chaffinch, silvereyes and fantails. Less frequently heard were kingfisher, wood pigeon, eastern rosella and blackbirds and a number of others. A comprehensive report , including comparisons with counts made in previous years will be prepared for the Bay of Plenty Regional Council which supports the pest control programme.

#### **DECEMBER 2014 REPORT**

It is nearing the end of 2014 and Landcare Okareka volunteers have had a busy year with numerous plantings around Lake Okareka. Have you been to have a look at Taumaihi

reserve at the end of Acacia Road recently? Or have you walked down Summit Road and through the plantings to Okareka Loop Road? The growth of the new plantings in both areas has been really incredible and it is really pleasing to hear the bird life in these places – as well as all around Lake Okareka.

The impact of all of the pest control work that is happening around Lake Okareka is having a positive impact on the biodiversity in the area. There is of course the animal pest control work that Forest & Bird Rotorua branch volunteers (some of whom are also Landcare Okareka volunteers) are doing in Lake Tikitapu Scenic Reserve. This work is supported by all of the local Okareka settlement householders who have purchased bait stations and are keeping them filled with bait regularly. The bait supplied by Bay of Plenty Regional Council is managed by Landcare Okareka.

And of course the other project is the trapping programme around the wetland marginal areas of Lake Okareka, which is managed by Mike Vincent and his team of trappers. This project has support from both Landcare Okareka and Lake Okareka Community Assn. The team have trapped over 230 rats since they started in September 2013. The guys are currently trialling some different bait in the traps and are trying to catch more mustelids (stoats and weasels) as well as rats. LOCA has obtained a further 20 trapping boxes and will be purchasing more traps for these.

We are also hoping to have a few more volunteer trappers join the team to help with this very worthwhile project. The aim is to protect the wetland birdlife, especially the rare and endangered dab chicks. It will be interesting to see what the autumn dab chick counts show for Lake Okareka. Well done to everyone who has taken part in any of these animal pest control projects around Lake Okareka – the native biodiversity - birds, insect life, bats and plants - of the area are all benefitting from your work! Maintenance of plantings and reserve areas is always on-going. Weeds, like rust, never sleep. Seedling willows, cherries, dogwoods along with blackberry, gorse, ivy and jasmine, spindle berry and Old Man's Beard are all target species for weed control around Lake Okareka, Landcare Okareka has the support of Rotorua District Council, Bay of Plenty Regional Council and Department of Conservation to undertake this weed control work in the local reserves. So don't be surprised to see some of the Landcare Okareka Volunteers out around the area undertaking this work over the next few months.



Currently there are three pairs of Dabchicks with young in the Jetty arm, juvenile Pied Stilts along the walkway. baby Scaup at Boyes Beach and ducklings all over the place so hopefully less rats will help with their survival.

DOC did not hold a spring count this year; the next count will be in the autumn. During this count we hope to also include the Blue Lake. Please remember you can help the birds by having bait stations on your property, keeping dogs out of the raupo and not speeding close to the shore if out boat-





#### TIMMS POSSUM TRAPS DECEMBER 2014



These Bay of Plenty Regional Council funded Timm's possum traps, are available on loan to any Lake Okareka residents, if you contact Sandra and Mike Goodwin 362 8865. The Lake Okareka community has 10 traps which were funded as "loan traps" by Bay of Plenty Regional Council. These traps have been borrowed at various times by members of the community. If you are having possum problems – maybe eating fruit or flowers or they are making a nuisance of themselves at night – and you would like to borrow a Timm's trap, give us a call.

If you are not familiar to the "Timm's trap", we will provide you with some instructions about how to use the traps. We will also give you some advice about what seems to work best as "bait" - such as apple with cinnamon, or apple and peanut butter. If you can, keep a note of any possums caught and pass that on to us when you return the trap. We like to know for our records what is being caught around the place and we can also pass that on to the Regional Council.

Lake Okareka Community Assn is in need of more volunteers to help look after the Department of Conservation camp up Millar Road. If you have no morning commitments such as work or young children, from 7.45 am for about an hour, we would appreciate hearing from you if you are able to offer your support – or if you are able to help with the evening shift from around 7.00 pm to about 8.00 pm. Both "shifts" involve "checking in" campers or making sure they have all paid, checking and cleaning toilets, picking up any rubbish or litter and just keeping an eye on the place. LOCA DOC Camp volunteers are offered some form of reward in recognition for their efforts. We find it easier to work in teams of 2 people. The teams are usually rostered on for a week at a time, but we do have some flexibility with others filling in if the current camp wardens have another engagement, for a night in their week that they are rostered "on duty".

Profits from the camp are going into improvements at the camp and conservation activities around Lake Okareka. In the last 12 months LOCA has paid a local contractor to lower and re-surface the camp sites. This has been much appreciated by campers – having more level sites. There has also been much less erosion from the camp sites of fine dusty material onto the roadway at the camp – this is appreciated by campers and camp wardens alike! Money is also going into the pest trapping project around the lake edges. A large project which will take a lot of the funds raised by the camp is the establishment of the new walking track between Boyes beach and the DOC camp up Millar Road. This walking track project was envisaged by DOC staff when the campground agreement between Lake Okareka Community Assn and DOC was signed off.


